Dear Safefood-Online users,

With 531 notifications in October, the number of new RASFF notifications was significantly higher than in September. You can find the evaluations as usual under point 1.

In the Office Journal of the European Union 6 regulations with new or amended maximum levels of pesticides were published. We also provide information on 2 draft regulations on changes to maximum levels of pesticide residues (point 2).

News on the topics of food safety and food fraud can be found under points 3 and 4.

Since January 2024, the EU Commission is publishing the monthly Agri-Food Fraud Report on suspected fraud cases (see also the [Safefood-Online Newsletter January 2024](#)). The Agri-Food Fraud Network (FFN) is part of the Alert and Cooperation Network (ACN).


Food Fraud Notifications (FFN) are published if there is a suspicion regarding fraud. From January 2024 to September 2024, 843 suspected cases were reported:

1. Notifications in Safefood-Online: October 2024

Compared to September, the number of new RASFF notifications in Safefood-Online increased significantly:

- **October 2024:** 531
- September 2024: 338
- August 2024: 331

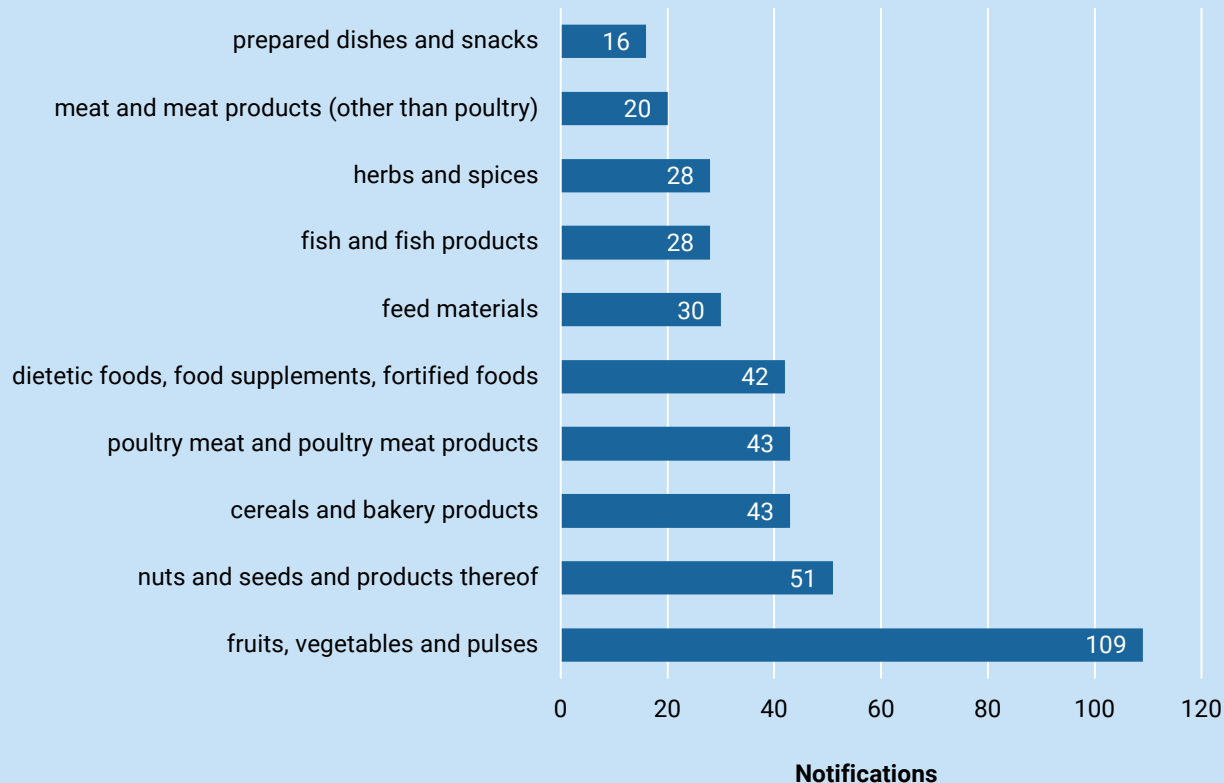
The notifications from October 2024 are divided as follows:

- Alert notifications: 133
- Border rejections: 163
- Information messages: 235



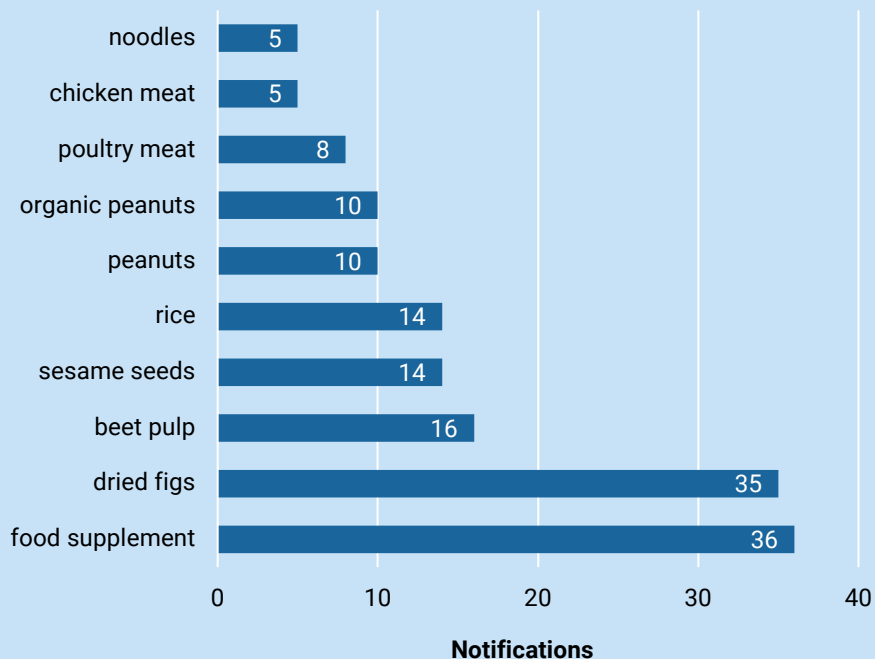
With 109 notifications in October, the number of new RASFF notifications in the product category fruit, vegetables and pulses has more than doubled compared to September. As a result, this product category is once again in first place. Dried figs from Turkey accounted for 35 notifications. This was due to findings of mycotoxins (aflatoxins and ochratoxin A). The product category nuts, seed and products thereof is following in second place with 51 notifications. Poultry meat/ poultry meat products and cereals/ bakery products are following, each with 43 notifications:

RASFF-Notifications October 2024: Top 10 product categories



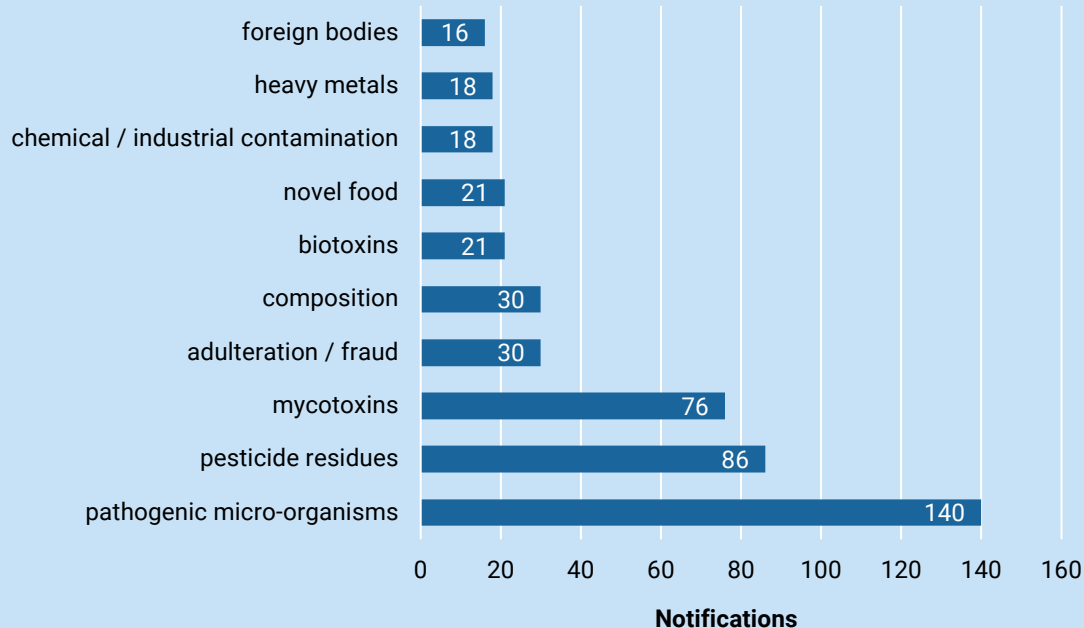
In the evaluation by product, food supplements and dried figs are in first and second place with 36 and 35 notifications, followed by beet pulp (animal feed) with 16 notifications. In all cases, these were border rejections of products from Russia when imported to Latvia:

RASFF-Notifications October 2024: Top 10 products



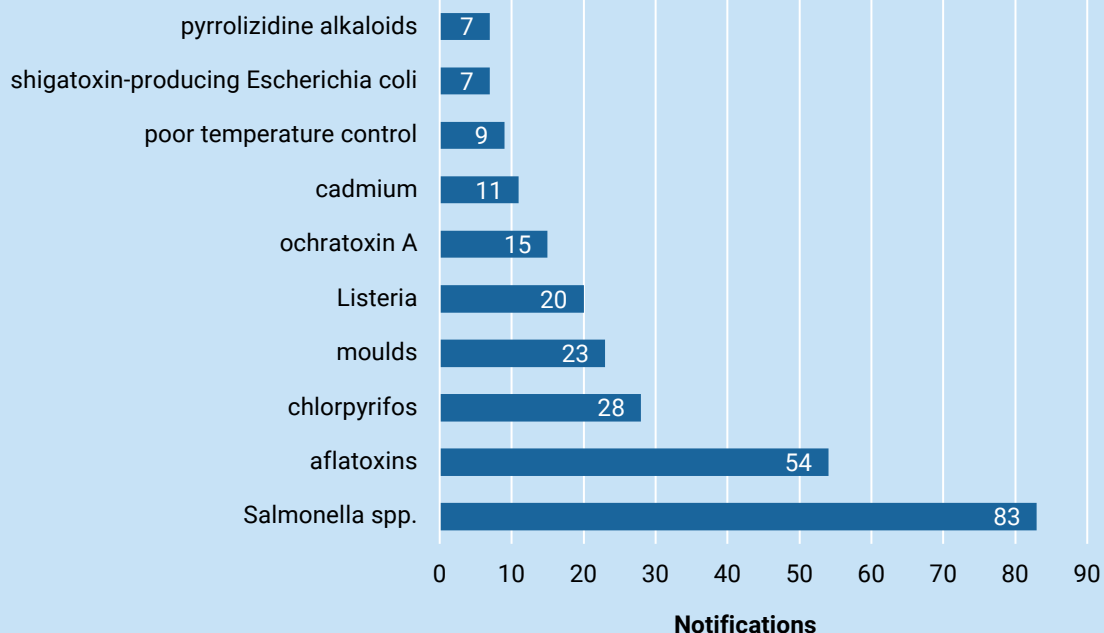
In the evaluation by hazard category, pathogenic micro-organisms were in first place with 140 notifications, followed by pesticides with 86 notifications (including 28 notifications due to chlorpyrifos findings). Mycotoxins are in third place with 76 notifications:

RASFF-Notifications October 2024: Top 10 hazard categories



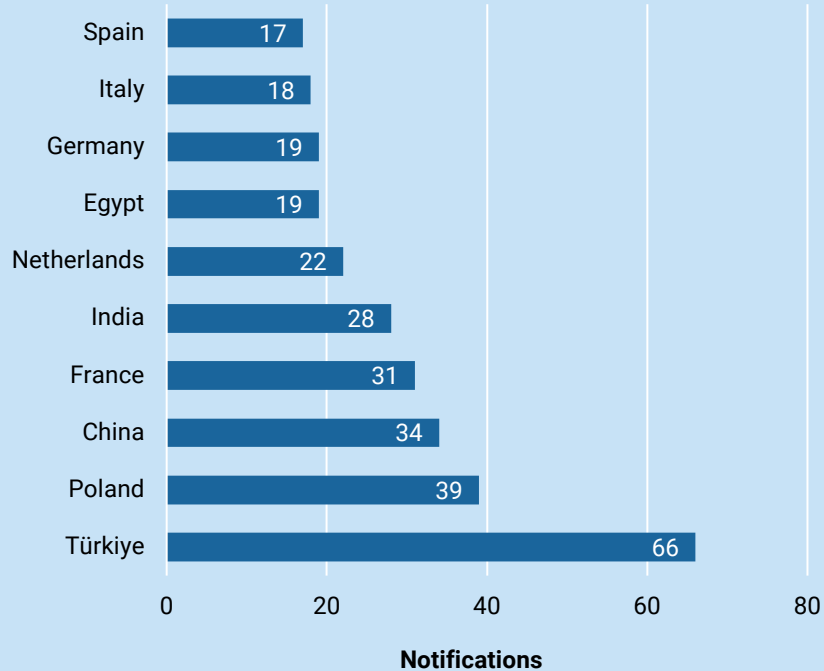
In terms of hazards, salmonella are in first place with 83 notifications, followed by aflatoxins with 54 notifications and chlorpyrifos with 28 notifications:

Finally, the evaluation of the notifications according to the country of origin of the products:

Türkiye is in first place with 66 notifications, followed by Poland and China with 39 and 34 notifications.

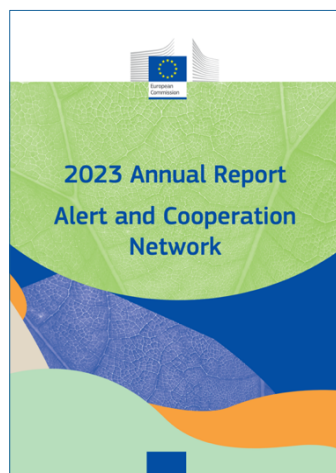

Alert and Cooperation Network (ACN): Annual Report 2023

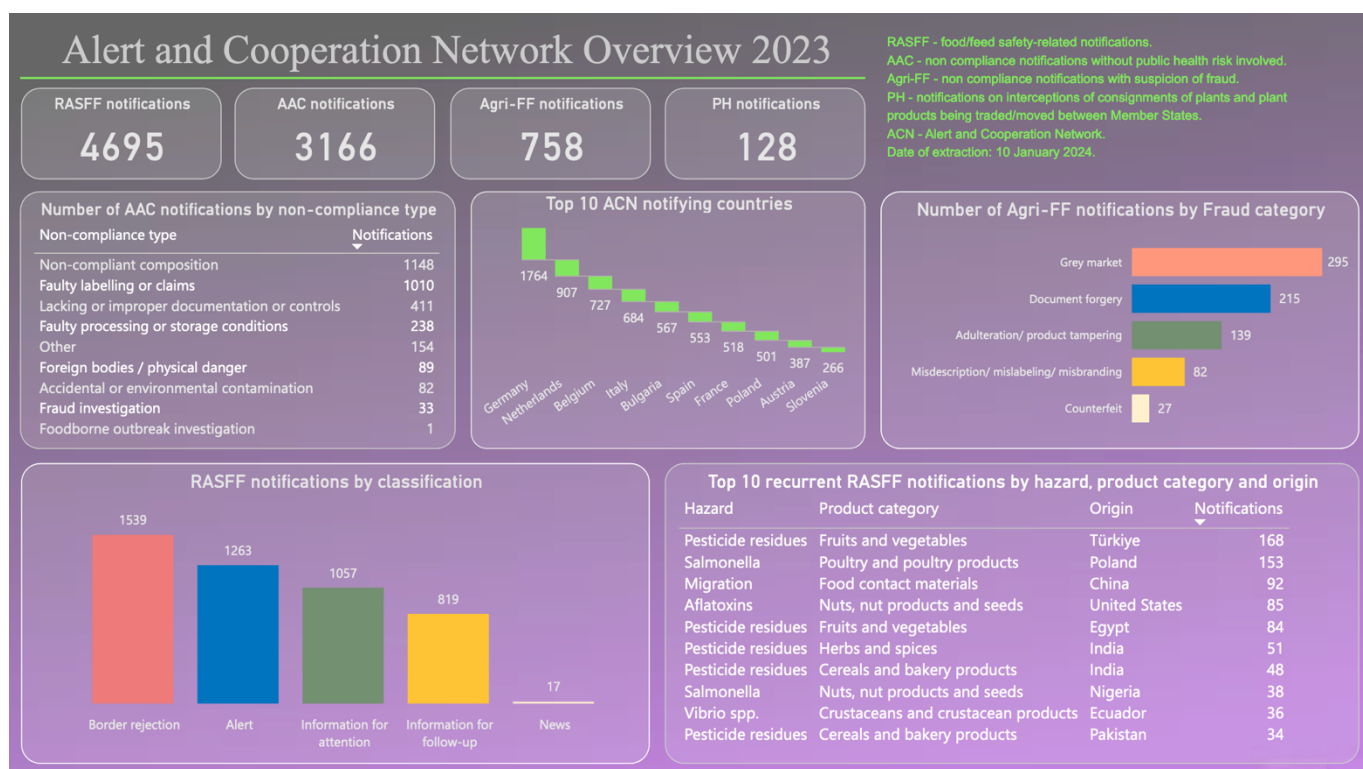


The **Annual Report 2023** of the Alert and Cooperation Network (ACN) contains a summary and evaluation of the information exchanged within the EU member states via the iRASFF. This includes the:

- RASFF (Rapid Alert System for Food and Feed)
- AAC (Administrative Assistance and Cooperation Network)
- FFN (Agri-Food Fraud Network)
- PHN (Plant Health Network); since 2023

The Plant Health Network (PHN), established in May 2022, was created to improve communication and cooperation between the plant health authorities of the EU Member States.

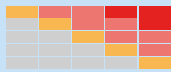
Below is a summary of the ACN activities in 2023 (source: **European Commission**):
